Dear Commissioner Máire Geoghegan-Quinn,

Thank you for the 'Analysis of public consultation'.

As you know, we have expressed concerns on the Common Strategic Framework laid out in the Green Paper. Our main concern is that the strategy does not mention social science, humanities or educational research as means to explore and solve the challenges facing Europe or as having a role in the innovations meant to address those challenges.

We insist that solutions for grand challenges must include the human factor. This is not because we represent those sciences, but because societal, economic and other challenges always include human beings and relations. Therefore there needs to be room for the research that addresses those relations: social science, humanities and educational research.

In the summary of the analysis of the consultation we believe we can see a trace: 'EU should support all stages in the innovation chain' (page 3) which indicates that the soft sciences need to be present at all stages. This is one solution, which has been brought forward in the

consultation responses. Another, as important, is to name a challenge that primarily addresses social science, humanities and educational research.



With this letter we hope to persuade you and your Directorate General to include 'soft sciences' in the work on the Horizon 2020.
